

Dear Village President, Trustees and Community Members,

On behalf the members of the Minooka Police Department, I am honored to present the 2017 Annual Report for your review. Once again, the men and women of this department continue to do an incredible job for the community while strengthening our programs and services.

Before you begin skimming through the report, I would like to highlight some of the significant items that occurred this past year:

- Purchase of In-Squad Cameras: As we continue to improve our practices on building trust of the community through transparency, the Village approved the purchase of In-Squad Cameras through Watchguard. We were able to outfit every patrol vehicle with digital video and install an interview room system for the amount of \$91,151.00. The purpose of video technology is to allow for accurate documentation of police-public contacts.
- Police Department Renovation: The six month renovation that begin on January 3rd, 2017 was completed by Talsma Builders. The renovation called for numerous upgrades including; office space, HVAC, technology and safety. The renovation was paid for using general fund reserves and police seizure funds for much needed office furniture improvements.
- Purchase of Radios: An Intergovernmental Agreement with Grundy County ETSB was approved
 along with the purchase of portable and mobile radios through Motorola. The agreement is for
 access to the StarCom21 Network to enhance our ability to effectively respond to 911
 emergency calls through public safety communications.
- Website Enhancement: A citizen survey has been added to the police department's website.
 The survey is designed to receive feedback from the community in regards to our effectiveness as a department.
- **Reduction of Traffic Crashes:** Traffic enforcement is an important function to aid in reducing traffic crashes. This past year we saw a reduction in reported traffic crashes, a first since 2013.
- Low Crime Rate: Even though the overall part I offenses saw an increase in thefts, the overall total is the second lowest since 2011.
- **No Formal Complaints:** Our main focus throughout the year was to have meaningful interactions with citizens and to provide them with legitimate reasons for the encounter while remaining neutral and transparent in decision making.
- Maintain Effective Programs: We have continued our goal of maintaining positive relationships
 with the community utilizing effective programs such as; DARE, Police Explorers, and Citizen
 Police Alumni Association as well as the many services our agency has to offer.

As we move forward in 2018, I am proud of the members of this department and their accomplishments throughout 2017. I would also like to thank the Village President and the Trustees for their continued support of the police department this past year. Together we will continue to strengthen our community for the residents to continue to call the Village of Minooka, a nice place to call home.

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
ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE AND RESPONSIBILITY

The Chief of Police is appointed by the Village President who has given up complete control of all Police Department operations and functions to the Chief of Police.

POLICE COMMISSION

The Board of Police Commissioners is a three-member commission appointed by the Village President and Village Board. The responsibility of the Commissioners is to hire all police officers and to promote current police officers to the rank of police sergeant.

This past year, the commissioners coordinated the testing process for entry level officers to establish an eligibility list. From the list that was established, Mr. Steven Carrabotta and Mr. Michael Rooney-Osborne were hired. The new recruits will begin the 14-week police academy on January 8th, 2018.



OFFICE OF THE CHIEF

The role of the Chief of Police is to provide leadership, direction and vision to the Department in the fulfillment of its overall mission. Chief Justin Meyer became the department's police chief in 2010. He is responsible for administering and managing the department's annual budget \$2,819,400.00 in addition to overseeing both the patrol and administrative duties.

PATROL DIVISION


The Patrol Division is the most vital structural component necessary to keep this department functioning effectively. Officers assigned to this division are responsible for the majority of police services rendered. Whether its traffic enforcement, community relations or calls for service, these uniformed officers continue to provide quality service to our community, 24 hours per day, 365 days per year.

This past year the patrol division was dispatched to 4,632 citizen generated calls, which is an increase of 394 more calls than in 2016.

The Minooka Police Department is dispatched by the Grundy County 911 Consolidated Center. This past year the executive committee, consisting of a member from each agency that is dispatched from the center, approved a new competitive and sustainable agency contribution formula.



In 2017, 22,457 events were created through the dispatch center. Of those events 4,632 were citizen generated and 17,825 were Self-Initiated.




TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

In April, our agency participated in the 1st annual Illinois Distracted Driving Awareness Week. The Illinois Chiefs Association and AAA sponsored the campaign and encouraged agencies throughout Illinois to participate.

Results during the campaign for our department was, 65 hours of enforcement with 70 warnings and 82 citations issued. The areas targeted were the high crash intersections.






Traffic Enforcement is an important function of the patrol division to aid in reducing crashes and to apprehend criminal activity.

IDOT TRAFFIC STOP DATA COLLECTION ANALYSIS



K-9

The Minooka Police Department canine program began in April 2014 when our K9 Rueger became certified. On an annual basis, all K9's in Illinois must re-certify in narcotic detection by the Illinois Training and Standards Board.

Rueger is used for drug investigations and tracking for missing people and non-violent offenders. Rueger loves to interact with the community and appears at several public demonstrations throughout the year.



This past year, Rueger and his K9 partners from several area departments conducted two unannounced drug

searches at
Minooka High
School and Jr.
High. Both
searches
resulted in
negative results.





On October 25th, Rueger sported some new digs by receiving a free vest from Vested Interest in K9's inc. a non-profit organization whose mission

is to provide bullet and stab protective vests to law enforcement agencies.

TRAINING An important and key element in providing a high level of professional service to the community, is maintaining continual education and training for the members of our



department. Training lowers liabilities, improves officer safety, as well as developing and improving an officers skills, knowledge and abilities to perform their job effectively.

Sergeant Matthew Chinski, is the departments training coordinator, he was assigned to the position in 2011. Sergeant Chinski is responsible to register, schedule, track and maintain a



record of all department members training.

In-service training is provided to all sworn members on a variety of diverse topics, including; annual review and re-certification in firearms and rifle training, use of force, oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray, impact weapons and control tactics, legal update-practical case law review, and ethics and cultural awareness.



SPECIALIZED UNITS

ILEAS MOBILE FIELD FORCE TEAM

The Region 3 Central Mobile Field Force is made up of 66 officers and 4 tactical paramedics/EMTs. The purpose of this unit is to supplement or assist any law enforcement agency in need during a crisis or emergency. The team may also be called upon to respond to a variety of disasters or emergencies, critical incidents, or events.





March 1st-3rd, Ottawa/Naplate Tornado: The city of Ottawa and Village of Naplate were both struck with a devastating EF-3 Tornado that did significant damage to buildings, infrastructure and resulted in two deaths.



May 24th, Oak Brook/McDonald's-Fight for \$15 March-Protest: Assisted Oak Brook PD with the Fight for \$15 minimum wage protest at the McDonald's Headquarters.



October 4th, deployed to the Will County States Attorney's office for the rally/protest of Semaji Crosby, calling for justice in the death of a child that occurred during summer in unincorporated area near Joliet that brought protesters from Chicago.

LaSalle County Deputy search: Assisted LaSalle County and Plainfield PD for the LaSalle County Deputy who was wanted for Vehicular Hijacking, Home Invasion and Aggravated Kidnapping.

KENDALL COUNTY SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM
The purpose of the KCSRT is to support Kendall
County law enforcement agencies with a tactical
response to critical incidents. The team trains once
a month in various trainings such as defensive
tactics and ground control, self-aid/buddy combat
wound care and several marksman/weapon training.
Sergeant James Sinovich is a member of the KCSRT, he
was present on 8 call outs in 2017.



MAJOR CRIMES TASK FORCE

Detective Ryan Macdonald is assigned to the Will/Grundy Major Crimes Task Force and the Kendall County Major Crimes Task Force. The purpose of these two task forces is to provide the Minooka Police Department the ability to solve major crimes through resource sharing, partnership building, joint cooperative and consistent training, and the application of investigative and enforcement methodology.



GRUNDY COUNTY HONOR GUARD

The Grundy County Honor Guard consists of Officers and Deputies from Minooka Police Department, Morris Police Department and the Grundy County Sheriff's Office.

Minooka Sergeant James Sinovich leads the team. Also, representing Minooka is

The administrative division provides support for the patrol division. The division is broken down into sections such as; Investigations, Community Policing and Records.

INVESTIGATIONS

The Records staff continues to strive to provide excellent service to both the citizens and department personnel.

In addition to their customer service duties they are responsible for the processing, distribution, and retention of all documents including offense/incident reports, traffic citations, warrants, crash reports and expungements.

On May 19th, Chief Meyer took to the rooftop of our Dunkin Donuts while the officers kept their feet on the ground below to greet and thank our supporters, because of their generosity we raised \$4,500.00.





Trivia Night, our biggest event, and 2017 marked our 10th year hosting this fundraiser. To say the least, 2017's Trivia Night was a success! We raised \$15,250.00 for Special Olympics Illinois through the Illinois Law Enforcement Torch Run! The department as a whole was excited about surpassing our \$15,000 goal.

INTERNET EXCHANGE LOCATION

One new service the Village implemented this year is an Internet Exchange location. The purpose of this service is to provide a neutral site for the exchange of internet purchases to help deter fraud and/or thefts.





CHILD SAFETY SEAT INSTALLATION In 2017, Sgt. Gary Fiedler and Sgt. Sean Beeler conducted 20 Child Safety Seat Inspections and/or Installations. This service is always free of charge for any resident to ensure the safety of their children.

When you are preparing to leave, let us know and we will be happy to check over your house for up to two-weeks. While you are away we will make trips to your home to check your doors and windows for security purposes. We had 139 house checks in 2017.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS

The Minooka Police Department offers two programs for the community to supplement and support our services. These two programs are one of our agencies greatest assets. Volunteers from these programs have spent many hours this past year to help the Village's events be a success.

POLICE EXPLORER PROGRAM #447

July 31st - August 4th, eight members of the Explorer post competed at the week long, State Explorer conference held at Lewis University. Our team of Explorers received a 1st place finish for building searches and one of our Explorers received a 4th place finished among 200 other Explorers in the written examination.





CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY/ASSOCIATION

The Citizen Police Academy is a 10 week program learning about the functions of the Minooka Police Department. After graduation, you can sign up to be an associate member of the Citizen's Police and work with the Officers. Members of the association meet bi-monthly, drive around in a citizen police squad in residential neighborhoods to be another set of eyes and ears and conduct traffic control at Village events.
